

Will of Maurice Dunn - 1733  
Wanborough Wiltshire, Eng.

In the Name of God Amen I Maurice Dunn of Wanborough in the County of Wills fordwainor this  
day of January in the fourth year of the Reign of King George the second And in the year of our Lord 1733  
one thousand seven hundred and thirty Do make and declare this my last Will & Testament  
Revolking all other and former Wills in manner and form following first I Comitt my Soul into the hands  
of Almighty God And my Body to be buried at the discretion of my Exorutor hereafter named And  
for my Real and Personal Estate I give and dispose thereof in manner and form following  
Inprimis I will that my funeral Expences and all Debts which I owe in Right or Consience to any  
Person or Persons whatsoever shall be fully satisfied and paid by my Exorutor herein after named within a  
Convenient time next after my decease Item I give devise and bequoth unto my kinsman Maurice Dunn  
Labourer who now inhabits with me (And Son of William my deceased Brother) All that my  
Messuage or dwelling house in which I now dwell with the Stable and all other the Outhouses  
Backside Garden Orchard and Cops thereto adjoining and belonging To hold the said Messuage  
dwelling house Stable Outhouse Backside Garden Orchard & Cops from & presently after my decease with  
the Appurtenances to the same belonging And also all my Estate Right Title and Interest therein  
unto the said Maurice Dunn my said Kinsman his <sup>heirs and assigns</sup> for ever To the only proper  
use and behoof of the said Maurice Dunn my said Kinsman his <sup>heirs and assigns</sup> for evermore  
Item I give and dispose unto Mary my Sister the Relict of Walter Winchcombe of Isbury in the  
County of Berks Ten Pounds in Money Item I give & bequoth in Money to each and every of her  
Children five Pounds a Piece Item I give and bequoth unto Robert Dunn of Bishopston in the  
County of Wills aforesaid Labourer five Pounds in Money Item I give and bequoth unto Alice  
the Wife of William Crookes of Wanborough aforesaid Labourer five Pounds in Money Item  
I give and bequoth unto Mary Shephord of Wanborough aforesaid Widow five Pounds in Money  
Item I give and bequoth unto Sarah Dunn the Relict of my Brother John five Shillings  
Item my Will is and I hereby order that my Exorutor shall pay or <sup>cause to be paid</sup> the Legacies herein  
before mentioned within the Space of Six Months time next after my decease And my Will is that  
if any or either of my Legacies shall happen to die before the time of Payment as aforesaid  
That then the Legacy of him or her so dying shall be & remain to the use of my Exorutor  
hereafter named Item further my Will is if it shall happen after my decease that my Exorutor  
shall at the Costs & Charges in the Law be forced to recover any my debts in order to pay and discharge  
any of the said Legacies That then my said Legacies shall pay or allow then proportionable parts  
for & towards the Charges for Recovery thereof Item I forgive and hereby acquit unto my kinsman  
William Dunn (son of William my deceased Brother) of Sighworth in the County of Wills aforesaid  
fordwainor all such debts & Sums of money which are & shall be due from him to me at the time of  
my decease Item I forgive and do hereby acquit unto Mary Dunn of Wanborough aforesaid the Relict  
of John Dunn my kinsman (son of John my deceased Brother) all such Sums of Money at the said  
John her deceased husbands and Item all the Residues of my Money Goods & Chattels whatsoever  
I give devise and bequoth unto the said Maurice Dunn my Exorutor of this my last Will and Testament In Witness whereof I have  
herunto set my hand and Seal the day and year first above written
