VIII—William Herbert Pearson, b-Boston, Aug. 29, 1848; m-Tampa, Fla., Apr. 10, 1890, Virginia Isabell Grable, who was living in Florida, 1922. He was secretary of the Boston Chamber of Commerce in the 1880s.

VIII—Ella Josephine Pearson, b-Boston, Sept. 7, 1851. She is (1933) Sister Josephine Margaret of St. Margaret's Convent (Episcopal) of Boston.

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28, 1786, son John (b-Mar., 1703, d-Providence, Feb. 18, 1772) and (m2) Lydia (Winsor, b-Aug. 5, 1709) Power, of Nicholas (1673-1734) and Mercy (Tillinghast, 1680, 1769) Power, of Nicholas (killed in King Philip's Swamp Fight, Dec. 19, 1675) and (m-1673) Rebecca (Rhodes) Power, of first Nicholas (d-N. Providence, 1657) and Jane (—) Power. The senior Nicholas Power was a youth with Roger Williams when the latter first (1635) arrived at Providence and with fifty-one others, participated in the second division of lands of Providence Plantations, 1640. Power Street in Providence is named for him. Lydia Winsor, dau. Samuel and Mary (Harding) Winsor, of Samuel (b-Providence, 1644) and Mercy (Williams, b-July 15, 1640, d-1715) of Joshua Winsor. Mary Harding dau. Abraham and Deborah Harding. Mercy Williams dau. Roger Williams, founder of Providence Plantations, 1635-6. Mercy Tillinghast dau. Philip and Martha (Holmes) Tillinghast, of Rev. Pardon (1622-1718, from England to Providence, 1643) and (m2-1664) Lydia (Tabor, 1640-1720) Tillinghast. Lydia Tabor dau. Philip (1605-69; to Watertown, Mass., 1634) and Lydia (Masters) Tabor. I., 1676) and (m-1610) Christiana (Peak, bapt. Feb. 13, 1584, d-af. 1659) Arnold from Ilchester, Somerset, England, June 24, 1635, in same boat with fam. of Stukely Westcott. John Power, Jr., was a Revolutionary soldier, serving with Col. Joab Stafford's co. of Independent volunteers; fought at Bennington, Aug. 16, 1777, and six days; he enlisted Sept. 5, 1777, in Capt. Thomas Bussey's Berkshire County (Mass.) co., known as the "Silver Grays," serving 28 days, then called to Pawlet, Vt., on an Alarm. His memorial at Adams, Mass., reads: "In Memory of those Friends and Ancestors of the East Hoosuck Society of Friends, who, at the sacrifice of religious scruples, took up arms in the War of Independence in defense of their homes and liberties." Following the death of her husband, Elizabeth m2-prob. Caleb Tibbitts. At Pittsfield, Mass., a deed is recorded under date May 22, 1786 of "Elisha Eds to Caleb Tibbitts and Elizabeth Power, widow of Adams, a farm in Adams." Y., was settled during the late years of 18th century, many from Cheshire, Mass., including Adams and nearby towns, migrated there. He settled on a farm tract nr. what is now Farmington. Before 1830, he moved on to what was called Farmington, Mich. Issue, by Deborah, 11 chn.: Diana, John, Ira, Nathan, Mary, Jerud, Samuel, Beluah, Abram, William, Esther; by Mary: Deborah, Duna; by Sarah: No issue. Of his issue, rec. only of Nathan.
