DEED BOOK 1 - 1807-1816

September 1, 1807. John Carter of Hopkins Co., Ky. appointed Henry Carter of the State and County aforesaid to be his true and lawful Attorney to sell a certain tract or parcel of land containing 200 acres lying and being in the Co. of Pendleton and State of South Carolina. Sam Woodson, Clk. P.4

September 26, 1807. Hannah Branson of Hopkins Co, Ky. appointed Ennis Sibley of the County of Henderson and state aforesaid to be his true and lawful Attorney to receive the payment of a certain sum of money from Joseph Lacy in the State of Virginia. P. 4

July 3, 1804. Nath'l Ashby of Fayette Co., Ky. conveys to Lewis Howell of Henderson Co. and state aforesaid a certain parcel of land on the waters of Pond River, Henderson Co., Ky. containing 150 acres, for 5 lbs current money of Ky. Witnesses: Daniel Ashby, Thomas Martin, Absalom Ashby, Alexander Andrew. Sam Woodson, Clk. P. 5

October 26, 1807. Thomas Adams, Richard Davis, Isham Browder, James Logan, William Wier, Joseph Berry, Thomas Anderson, Stephen Ashby, Hopkins County Justices of Peace, to Daniel McGary and Solomon Silkwood of Hopkins Co., Ky. Refund bond, 1000 lbs. for 40 acres of land at the present seat of Justice, Hopkins Co., Ky. which was given by McGary and Silkwood. Refund the money for which the lots sell. Sam Woodson, Clk. P. 7

September 8, 1807. Bounds Ashby of Co. of Hopkins, State of Ky. to Vincent Fugate of county and state aforesaid, all of his part of the estate left to him by his father, Henry Ashby, deceased. Witnesses: Argyle Ashby, Lewis x Robertson. Sam Woodson, Clk. P. 6

January 26, 1808. Solomon Silkwood and Hannah, his wife, of Hopkins County, Ky. to William R. McGary of said county and state. A parcel of land lying in the County aforesaid and adjoining town of Madisonville, Ky., containing 85 and one quarter acres for 85 dollars. Sam Woodson, Clk. P. 8

ORDER BOOK # 1-A
FIRST COURT IN HOPKINS COUNTY

May 25th, 1807.

"Be it Remembored, that at the house of Robert McGary, in the County of Hopkins, on Monday, the 25th day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seven, in pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly entitled "An Act for the Division of Henderson County" approved on the 9th day of December, one thousand eight hundred and six, and in pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly entitled "An Act altering the Times of Holding Certain Courts in this Commonwealth" approved the 27th day of December, one thousand eight hundred and six, a commission was produced from his Excellency, Christopher Greenup, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, bearing date of the 29th of December, one thousand eight hundred and six, directed to Richard Davis, Russoll Weir, Thomas Anderson, Thomas Adams, Stephen Ashby, Isham Browder, James Logan, and Joseph Berry, Esqrs., appointing them Justices of the Peace in the County of Hopkins.

Whoreupon, Richard Davis, Esquire, first named in said commission, administered to Russoll Wier, Esquire, the oath to support the Constitution of the United States, the oath of fidelity to the commonwealth of Kentucky, and the oath of the Justice of the Peace for Hopkins County, and thereupon the said Russoll Wier, Esquire, administered the said oath above mentioned to the said Richard Davis, Esquire, who administered the several oaths to the above named Thomas Anderson, Thomas Adams, Stephen Ashby, James Logan, Isham Browder and Joseph Berry. And then a Court was holden for the said County of Hopkins."

May 25th, 1807.

This day David Wright, Esquire produced in Court a commission from his Excellency Christopher Greenup, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, bearing date the fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seven directed to the said David Wright, Esquire, appointed him Sheriff of the County of Hopkins. Whereupon the said David Wright, Esquire took oath to support the Constitution of the United States, the oath of fidelity to the Commonwealth aforesaid and also the
