**Death of Freeman Trowbridge.**


The Great Reaper has again been at work in our midst and taken another old settler, another old friend of those who were here when the country was new and untried and life was all before them. This time it is Freeman Trowbridge who has been called to his last rest, and whose work is done.

Mr. Trowbridge settled on a farm in Springfield thirty-four years ago, having come to Minnesota two years previous. Ten years ago he moved to Wilder where he lived till three years ago, when Mrs. Trowbridge died. Since that time he has made his home with his son, Hiram Trowbridge, at whose home in this city he died last Friday night, after an illness of about three weeks. When first taken sick the doctors pronounced it appendicitis and had he not been so old would have operated, but at his age it was not safe to do so.

He was born in York state in September, 1824, and at the time the Civil war broke out was in Wisconsin and enlisted with the 4th. Wisconsin cavalry.

The funeral services were held in the Methodist church, of which he had been a member many years, Rev. Cook officiating, Sunday afternoon. The G. A. R. attended in a body and marched to the cemetery where they

**HIRAM TROWBRIDGE.**

Word came here Friday morning that Hiram Trowbridge, who went to the soldiers' home at Minneapolis early in the spring with the hope that the treatment there would restore his health, had been relieved of his sufferings and had passed away.

Mr. Trowbridge was an old resident here, having come to Cottonwood county shortly after the war. For several years he was proprietor of the Park Hotel, having retired a few years ago upon the failure of his health and moved to Wilder to make his home. He leaves a widow, one daughter, Mrs. Gibbs, to mourn. Deceased was born in Dodge County, Wis., Feb. 10, 1849. Enlisted at Milwaukee Dec. 2nd, 1862, and was honorably discharged from the service July, 20, 1865. He was a member of La Grange post G. A. R. and also of the Windom I O O F Lodge, under whose auspices the funeral was conducted from the M. E. church in this city on Sunday afternoon and was largely attended, Rev. Gillis giving a consoling and sympathetic sermon from the words "I would not live always." Job. 14: 17. The impressive burial service of the I. O. O. F. was given at the grave.
