



Friday April 29, 1881

James Bailey Drowned, And His Six Year Old Boy Narrowly Escapes A sad feeling pervaded this community last Saturday when the news was spread that James Bailey had been drowned in the Big Ocheydan the day before. The following map will aid in getting a correct idea of the particulars A-Bridge over the OcheydanB- Point the team went into the channelC- Point where the body of Mr Bailey was foundD-Low bluff east side of bridgeE-Bl uff on the west sideF- Wagon road G-Channel of the Ocheydan Mr. Bailey had recently purchased a farm on the east side of the of the ocheydan, being the SE ¼ of Sec 32-100-40. On Friday the 22nd inst. He had employed Henry Lindsay, and started with three loads of farm machinery on household goods from his old farm four miles west of town, intending to take them to his new farm. Mr. Bailey drove the head team, Henry Lindsay the second, while the third team was being led behind the second wagon. They arrived at the Big Ocheydan on the town line road about the middle of the afternoon, and found the water covering the whole flat and from two to three feet over the grade, but not over the bridge. Mr. Bailey drove his team through all right and



he looked back he saw that Lindsay was going to far down steam and called to him to keep further up, but Lindsay understood him to say "keep further down," which he did, and this led him into the main channel of the creek. Lindsay took the boy in one arm to keep him from going under the water, and with the other hand succeeded in getting three tugs of the last team unhitched, but the rushing of the water made it almost impossible for him to do anything. By this time Bailey had unhitched, mounted one of his horses, and started back to render assistance. When on the bridge he shouted to Lindsay: "Save the boy and let the team drown; you need not pay for it." [It appears that young Lindsay had purchased the team from Bailey, but had not paid for it.] He then started to ride up to the team that was in the deepest water, but his horse plunged into the main channel of the creek and went down. When they came back up, Bailey was thrown off and went to the bottom. He came up once more and then disappeared. Lindsay then carried the boy to dry land and placed him in charge of Mrs. D. J. Jones, who carried him to her home nearly half a mile distant, and cared for him as only a tender woman can care for a suffering child. The boy had become very chilled by being in the cold, and was in quite a critical condition. One horse was drowned and some of the good carried quite a distance down the stream, but were subsequently recovered. Mrs. Douglass wishes us to state that too much credit cannot be given to Mr. And Mrs. D. J. Jones for the valuable assistance they rendered the searching party and the very kind treatment they gave the little boy. News of this sad affair did not reach Sibley until Saturday morning, when Sheriff Douglas proposed the organization of party to search for the remains of the drowned man. This was seconded by C. J. Skuse, O. J. and Chas Hungerford, Mr. Riddlebarger, Del. Lee, P H. Laddenberger and Fred Russell. They procured some grappling hooks and a boat of G. A. Carew, and started. A portion of the party remained on the search until after 10 o'clock Saturday night, while the rest came to town to procure more grappling hooks and a boats. On Sunday the following named gentlemen were added to the searning party G. A. Carew, Wash riggs, G. A. Pitman, Ed. Reynolds, C. D. parker, W. F. Herbert, J. Blair, S. Johnson, John Caughlin, Ed Lindsay and two sons, Miles Hamlin, The Lewis boys, Chas McCurdy, the Daileys, C. H. Bull, D. J. Jones, W. H. Dunning, J. J. Moar, D. H. Boyd, Geo. Taylor, Mr Fox, And a number of other who names we are not able to learn. A persistent

dragging of the bed of the creek and a portion of the botton was kept up from point B to a point half a mile below. About half past 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoon a party was working at the point "C" when the drag hook of C. J. Skuse made itself fast to garments of the unfortunate man, and he was drawn from the watery grave. Sheriff Douglass took the immediate charge of the corpse, placed it in C. W. Bull's hack, brought it to town, and packed it in ice,. While the preparation for burial were being made. The funeral services took place at the M. E. Church at 4 o'clock on Monday afternoon, and were conducted by Rev E. M. Heyburn. The deceased was an excellent man and one of our most industrious citizens. Both him and his family had seen some hard times since they came into county, and had got nearly out of debt, while there was prospect of a greater prosperity for them in the future. But how soon is this changed; the main support of the family structure is suddenly swept away, and the lonely widow and four children left sorrowing in the chaos of the event. To-day, exultant hope rules supreme, and tomorrow its is dashed to the ground amid the ruins of death and adversity. The morning dawns upon a happy home, while the shades of night gather around the broken and sorrowing household, who's only thought is of a departed love one. Thus in the midst of life we are in death.
