During the 1850 federal census enumeration of Pike County, Arkansas, William H. Preston, Assistant Marshal, failed to make a new number for the John Choat household, thus it appears they are a part of the William Stone household in the original record. John Choat would have been household number 47/47 following the William Stone household 46/46. All household numbers in this transcript beginning with John Choat reflect the corrected number as it would have appeared without the error.

them to abandon this tract of country where the Indian title was not extinguished. On their way back to St. Louis they stopped at the Wolf Creek Settlement the last settlement they visited in that quarter of country and apprised the people of their business and discovered they, as with the other settlers of this region, were industrious and respectable. They were treated with "the utmost ... hospitality" even though these citizens resented the order of their government. They had been annexed to the County of Arkansas and by its officers assessed and had paid taxes and had magistrates commissioned to their settlements, militia officers, &c., all of which they considered as placing them under the protection and subjecting them to the will of the executive authority in all cases, but removal. See the Territorial Papers of the United States, Clarence Edwin Carter, The Territory of Louisiana-Missouri, 1815-1821, pp. 182-183. Nonetheless the Kelleys living on Wolf Creek chose to remain and likely were among those citizens living south and southwest of the Arkansas river who petitioned Governor Clark to allow them to remain on their improvement or at least stay until they could harvest and secure their crops for market that year.

James G. Melson settled about three miles south of the Kelleys near the Little Missouri river west of the public road. He arrived in 1816 from Boone county, Missouri. His previous residence was in Jefferson County, Mississippi. As prior indicated, when the first government land surveys were made (1819) in Clark (now Pike) County, Arkansas, the Melson improvements are shown in the original survey plat as two cultivated areas each described as "Melsem's Field" in Township 9, South of Range 23 West. His family consisted of his wife Rosanna Melson and children: Mary, Solomon, Rosanna, Washington and Emily. Other early settlers of this area of the Little Missouri included Samuel Bittick and Richard Wood.

Samuel Bittick, believed to be the one who married Nancy Williams in Orange county, North Carolina on March 31, 1798, eventually settled in Missouri and by 1815 located in Lawrence county, Arkansas. From there he moved to Clark (now Pike) county, Arkansas where he died about 1826. This family included Jesse Bittick and probably Francis and Rebecca Bittick. Francis Bittick married Mary Melson. Rebecca Bittick married Walter C. McLaughlin. Others of the Samuel Bittick family (or) closely related to them in Clark and Pike county, Arkansas were Elinor Bittick the wife of John Cheairs, Robert Bittick, Jonathan A. Bittick husband of Jinsy Butler and Lucinda Bittick who married Alexander B. Caruthers. Jonathan A. Bittick left Arkansas and moved to Shelby county, Texas in 1830. John Cheairs moved to Hempstead County, Arkansas and later entered Texas by 1835.

Richard Wood came to Arkansas and died at the Little Missouri, Clark (now Pike) county, Arkansas in 1822. Additional members of this early family were: Jacob Wood, James Wood, Jeptha Wood, John Wood, Thomas Wood, Patsy Wood, Polly Wood who later married Jesse Bittick son of Samuel Bittick, and Fanny Wood who later became the wife of William Ward son of James Ward.

In 1817 William Gentry from Stewart County, Tennessee and his brother-in-law James Ward also from Tennessee settled in Clark (now Pike) county, Arkansas. They located on Wolf Creek on the east side of the Southwest Trail which was also referred to as the military or public road. The early court records indicate a Tyre (Tirey) Gentry thought to be the father of William Gentry and Samuel Narrad father of Jane Gentry wife of William Gentry were early settlers of Clark county, Arkansas. William Gentry and James Ward entered section 35 in Township 8, South of Range 23 West. To the east on the Clark county side of the Antoine bayou near Wolf Creek in Section 25, David Edmiston from Tennessee settled in 1818.

Samuel Hasley arrived in 1818 from Dickson county, Tennessee and eventually located on Wolf Creek and became a neighbor of Elijah Kelley. His children included: Drewry, Samuel and Mariam Hasley. Drewry Hasley married Mary Ann Wingfield. Samuel Hasley married Sarah Wingfield. Mariam Hasley married 'Charles Wingfield who came to Arkansas from Illinois in 1817. They lived at Antoine, Pike county, Arkansas and their tombstone markers are still standing (1993) in the Antoine Cemetery at Antoine, Arkansas. A William C. Hasley settled in Clark and later Hempstead county, Arkansas and married Susanna Wingfield daughter of William Wingfield. He was likely the son of the senior Samuel Hasley.

John Ish a native of Pennsylvania was an early settler of Clark (now Pike) county, Arkansas from Tennessee. He married Cynthia Edmiston May 20, 1819 a daughter of David Edmiston and eventually moved to Washington county, Arkansas in 1828 where they settled near Morrow.

Joseph Delaney another early citizen of this pioneer community of southeast Pike county, Arkansas married Nancy Edmiston a daughter of David Edmiston.

Henry G. McLaughlin who came with his parents to the Antoine, Clark county, Arkansas in 1818 or 1819 from Bellevue, Washington county, Missouri married Malinda Edmiston also a daughter of David Edmiston. They made their home in Pike county, Arkansas until 1835 when they moved to Washington county, Arkansas with other members of the Edmiston family.
