8. John⁴ **Cantrell** (John [Cantrill]⁵, Joseph⁶, Richard⁷)⁵⁷. Born, circa 1751, in New Castle Co., PA (now DE). Died, 1825, in Spartanburg Co., SC. Probate of Estate: 17 Oct 1825, in Spartanburg Co. Occupation: miller.

He served in the War for American Independence from the Salisbury district of South Carolina. After the war he owned a mill on Buck Creek and was known as "Miller John." He was Baptist.

9. Thomas⁴ **Cantrell** (John [Cantrill]⁵, Joseph⁶, Richard⁷)⁵⁸. Born, 23 Jan 1761. Died, 25 Sep 1830, in Grady, McMinn Co., TN. Burial in Grady.

Thomas served in the Revolutionary War as a private in the command of LtCol. Lytle of Caswell Co., NC. See Roster of Revolutionary Soldiers, The Tennessee Society DAR, 1894-1960, compiled by Edyth Whitley, p. 407.

The same is reflected in Christie:

"The War Records, at Washington, D.C., show that 'Thomas Cantrell served as a member, rank and company not stated, of Lieutenant Colonel Lytle's command, Caswell County, North Carolina, Revolutionary War.' His name has been found only on a list, not dated, of men enrolled for Captain Robert Moore, from Caswell county."

According to Christie, "There is a tradition which comes from William Magness Cantrell, that: 'Thomas Cantrell, in company with Mr. Adcock, who was an uncle of his grandmother, were captured at the battle of the Cowpens, S.C., and placed on a British ship to be sent to England. After getting some four miles from land, they escaped by jumping overboard and swimming to shore, having to escape not only the dangers of the sea, but also the fire of the British.'

"He was a deacon in the Baptist church. He and his wife are buried in the old cemetery at Grady. This town was first known as Cantrell's Cross Roads; later the name was changed to Williamsburg, and to-day is known as Grady. The inscription on his tombstone reads:

"Here lies the body of Thomas Cantrelle, Born January 23, 1761. Died September 25, 1830."

After their marriage they first settled in Greenville district, SC, according to Christie, but later moved to Tennessee. It has been said that he was the first of the name to migrate to that state. He settled on Sink Creek, DeKalb County, where he operated an iron forge, which is still called the "Old Forge," and where one of his descendants now lives, Christie said in 1908.

14. Reuben⁴ **Roberts**⁷¹. Born, 4 Jan 1743/4, in Manchester, Lancashire, England. Died, 2 Aug 1841, in Warren Co., TN. Burial in Asbury Methodist Church, Warren Co. Occupation: farmer, surveyor.

Reuben Roberts enlisted in the Continental Army at Hillsborough, NC, for two years and was assigned to Capt. William Lytle's company of Col. Archibald Lytle's regiment of the 6th Corps of North Carolina under Gen. Francis Nash, after whom Nashville was named. He was wounded at Germantown. He later served in the North Carolina Militia.

He married⁷² Mary Millie **Asher** (15), Aug 1785. Children:

She was a widow at the time of their marriage. They lived in Orange Co., NC, until 1791, then moved to Washington Co., near the present town of Elizabethton, TN. In 1802 they moved to Anderson Co., TN, where they lived for 10 years, then in 1811 moved to Warren Co.

She received a Revolutionary War widow's pension after Reuben's death.

16. **John [Cantrill]⁵ Cantrell (Joseph⁶, Richard⁷)⁷⁵**. Born, Oct 1724, in New Castle Co., PA (now DE). Died, 1803. Baptism: 25 Mar 1726.

He married⁷⁵, first, [-----] **Brittian** (18). Children:

i. **Abraham⁴ Cantrell⁷⁵**. Born, circa 1744, in New Castle Co., PA (now DE). Resided in Spartanburg Co., SC.

He was a soldier in the War for American Independence from the Salisbury district of South Carolina. Tradition says he was a captain. After the war he moved with his family to Spartanburg Co., SC.

From Whitley: "In 1790 he sold land in Spartanburg, S.C., to Thomas Kevil. He is spoken of as of Pendleton County at that time. This land was 350 acres on Endree River, Deed Book D, p. 422, Spartanburg, S.C. In 1794 he sold to John Jones 100 acres at which time his is also spoken of as of Pendleton County."

ii. **Isaac Cantrell⁷⁶**. Born, circa 1745, in New Castle Co., PA (now DE). Died in Warren Co., TN. Occupation: Baptist minister.

His name appears on the pay rolls at Raleigh, NC, as serving in the War for American Independence from the Salisbury District.

According to Christie, about 1788 it is recorded in a very old Baptist church record that Isaac Cantrell was an itinerant minister serving the Baptist church at Matrimony Creek, Strawberry district, without pay. This is the first record of a minister in the family in America.

vii. **Joseph Cantrell⁷⁹**. Born in New Castle Co., PA (now DE). Probate of Estate: May 1804, in Hillsboro, NC.

It is claimed that he was in the Revolutionary War and that his record is at Raleigh, NC.

viii. **Charles Cantrell⁸⁰**.

From Whitley: "Last known of him was in Rockingham County, N.C. He appears to have sold his interest in his father's estate to John Purkle, 1803, containing 50 acres. [Deed Book G p. 254]."

ix. **Joshua Cantrell⁸¹**.

x. **Aaron Cantrell⁸¹**.

From Whitley: "Moved to South Carolina and settled."

xi. **Simon Cantrell⁸²**. Resided in Spartanburg Co., SC.

In 1780-81 Simon, Aaron and Peter served as scouts for Gen. Francis Marion. They were taken prisoner and condemned to be shot. Aaron and Peter may have escaped, but Simon was executed.

xii. **Peter Cantrell⁸²**. Resided in Spartanburg Co., SC.

xiii. **Reuben Cantrell⁸³**. Born, circa 1762, in Rockingham Co., NC. Resided in Rutherford Co., NC.

xiv. **Edward Cantrell⁸⁴**. Resided in Rockingham Co., NC.

xv. **William Cantrell⁸⁵**. Born, circa 1766, in Rockingham Co., NC. Resided in Spartanburg Co., SC.

xvi. **Benjamin Cantrell⁸⁶**. Born, circa 1768, in Rockingham Co., NC. Died, circa 1843, in Warren Co., TN. Resided in Spartanburg Co., SC.

xvii. **James Cantrell⁸⁷**. Born in Rockingham Co., NC. Resided in Spartanburg Co., SC.

He married⁷⁵, second, **Jane Surname unknown⁷⁵**. She is said to have born John four sons and two daughters.

The following is from Cantrell-Potter-Magness Ancestry of Alvin Edward Potter Sr., researched and compiled by Edythe Rucker Whitley of Nashville, TN,

1938:

The records at Spartanburg reveal that his sons Abraham, Stephen and Moses administered on his estate. Jane Cantrill received a dower in the settlement of the estate. This is recorded in Book L, of deeds Page 193, dated 1803-1808, Spartanburg, South Carolina. In this record Aaron Templeman is mentioned.

John Cantrill appears to have removed from Delaware to Rockingham County, North Carolina before the Revolutionary War. Shortly after the war he moved to the Ninety-Six District, now Spartanburg County, South Carolina, where he owned over eight hundred acres of land on Buck Creek, waters of Peculate River.

He was one of the first members of Buck Creek Baptist Church. This church is at present [1937] located on the same spot as it was two hundred years ago. There is a new church house with later additions but the land has been occupied by a church house for over two hundred years.

It has been my pleasure to visit the church on two different occasions and on each I have talked to some of the members. The building is rather large for a rural church; is built of white lumber, painted white, with rock foundation, situated on a hill wuite [sic] near the main highway. The old cemetery frames the building half way on each side and around the rear. There are stones of the seventeenth century dotted with the more modern eighteenth century ones. There are Cantrills, but not of this immediate family. All the Cantrill tombs I examined were of later dates.

John Cantrill is buried about three miles from this church near the main highway about two miles from Mayo, South Carolina. Mayo, is a small village on the highway from Spartanburg, South Carolina, to Rutherfordton, North Carolina. The old Cantrell cemetery is located on lands now [1937] owned by Mr. Henry Cash aged eight-nine to ninety-three years, who talked fluently about the old Cantrill family, when I visited in

Christie notes that Thomas served in the Revolutionary War from Pennsylvania. This is confirmed by a National Archives Revolutionary War pension record from Pennsylvania which contains, under the heading "Additional evidence for Pennsylvania Claims:"

"Not dated, Thomas Norris reduced circumts, asserted by a number of respectable persons and approved by Judge Peters Nov. 23, 1818."

21. Catherine [Catharina]⁶ **Heath** (John⁷)⁹². Born, circa 1697.

The following from Christie:

"They were living in New Castle County, PA, on or near the site of the present city of Wilmington, DE, and were attendants at Holy Trinity [Old Swedes] Church before 1720. It is probable that Catharina was a daughter of one of the Old Swedes, first settlers of this section, but Christie could not verify this. Their first three children were baptized at the old historic church still used [1908] and known as Old Swedes, which is one of the oldest and quaintest churches in this country.

"At the time Joseph went there, the area was known as Christina. Many of the earliest records of this locality have been lost or destroyed, and at best are very incomplete. There is evidence, however, from the scattered records in New Castle county today [again, 1908], that descendants of Richard Cantrill lived there from before 1720 until 1797, though the majority moved south during this period."

SEVENTH GENERATION

22. Richard⁷ **Cantrill**⁹³. Born, before 1689. Died, before 1754. Resided in Philadelphia, PA.

All of the following is from Christie:

A resident of Philadelphia, Richard in July 1689 was appointed administrator of the estate of Joseph Cantrill, an unmarried nephew, who was drowned in the Schuylkill River May 10, 1689.

Christie was unable to find records proving the parentage or birthplace of Richard, but she did not doubt he came from the Derbyshire branch of the English family. His name does not appear on any list of emigrants and he may have been a descendant of William or Henry Cantrell of Virginia.

She quotes from "Pennsylvania Archives," Vol. XIX:

"At a meeting of the Commissioners, 6th of July, 1692. Present Captain William Markham, Robert Turner, John Goodson, . . . Richard Cantrill requesting a warrant for a lot of 30 ft. upon Third Street, near the Burying Ground, was granted."

From Original Records, Deed Book D, 53, page 50: "Richard Cantrill to Thomas Hall, Sold 30 ft. x 190 ft. May 13, 1693, Third and Market Streets."

In Patent Book A, Vol. II, page 344, there is a lease for twenty-one years

[May 5, 1702] made by Edward Shippen, Griffith Owen and James Logan, as Proprietary and Governor in Chief of Pennsylvania and Territories thereunto belonging . . . of a . . . "Certain tract of land between Fifth and Sixth streets containing three acres and sixty perches" [there follows a full description by metes and bounds] "to Richard Cantrill, Brickmaker, with all woods and underwood and trees, ways, waters, water courses, liberties, profits, commodities, advantages and opportunities whatsoever." The rental was forty shillings per year, "current silver money of the Province. . . . Said Richard Cantrill shall build, erect and set up a substantial brick house one story and a half in height and in breadth eighteen feet and in length thirty-six feet; the first story of one brick and a half and the second story of one brick, and further that said Richard Cantrill shall make an orchard upon some part of the hereby granted land, with at least eighty good bearing apple trees planted thereon, and shall also well and sufficiently fence and enclose the said demised land."

In "Pennsylvania Archives" Christie found:

"Cantrill, Old Rights: Richard Cantrill, city lot 3 acres, 10 day, 10 month, 1701. Rich. return 3 acres, 3 month 1702."

Later the Archives record a "Caveat against surveying of land adjoining Richard Cantrill's estate, issuing to the heirs, or executors of the said Richard Cantrill, or any under him, May 31, 1753."

No record could be found of the disposition of the estate of Richard Cantrill, either by his heirs or executors, but he evidently died prior to May 31, 1753.

There is a tradition common in the family that the first Cantrill in Philadelphia had a brick yard and built the first brick house in that city. Records show that "the first brick house built in Philadelphia was owned by Robert Turner in 1684-5," and in the same year Richard Cantrill's brother-in-law, Daniel Pegge, also built a brick residence on "Pegge's Run." It is possible that Richard Cantrill had the contract for erecting both of these houses, which would easily account for the tradition in the family.

From Christie:

Dorothy was the daughter of Ellis and Jane Jones, who came to America from either Flint or Denbigh, Wales, in the ship Submission, Sept. 1682.

From the Log of the Submission:

"Ellis Jones, age 45, Jane Jones, age 40,
Barbara Jones, age 13, Mary Jones, age 12,
Dorothy Jones, age 10, Isaac Jones, age 4 mos."

The "Pennsylvania Historical Magazine," in a list of names of "Important Colonists, who came in the Submission," mentions Ellis Jones. He was a resident of Bucks County, 1684, but did not remain there long, and in the Welsh Tract Purchases his name appears as having purchased one hundred acres in Nantonell parish, Radnor.

Ellis Jones and his family were Quakers and as Richard Cantrill belonged to the Church of England, Richard and Dorothy were married, to use a Quaker term, "Out of Meeting."

Dorothy Jones Cantrill seems to have been a young lady of considerable spirit and independence of character. She not only married the man of her choice, irrespective of her religious training, but later evidence is found of her love of gaiety and society in an old history of Philadelphia, where she figured at a masquerade ball, much to the horror of her more quiet Quaker friends. She seems to have inherited her love of society from her mother, for the name of Jane Jones appears as a witness to the marriage of a great many Quakers of her day, and the Quaker weddings were probably the principal events affording those of that sect an expression of their social instinct.

The will of Jane Jones, relict of Ellis Jones, executed at Philadelphia, Aug. 3, 1730, and recorded at Philadelphia, Dec. 27, 1732, mentions her grandchildren: "Zebulon Cantril, Joseph Cantril, and Dorothy Cantril," to each of whom she bequeaths: "One English shilling, or the value of it in coyne current."

She married⁹⁴ Richard **Cantrill** (22).
