John Bent who made the following Declaration on oath pursuant to the act of Congress of the United States entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land & naval service of the United States during the Revolutionary War". That he entered the land service of the United States in the war of the Revolution as a private soldier in a company commanded by Capt. George Wally in the 1st Continental Regt. of South Carolina commanded by Col. Charles L. Pinckney attached to the Company of that Regt. commanded by Capt. — Turner, that in this Company he acted as Sergeant for some time and was finally appointed and Commissioned Adjutant of the Regiment with the rank of Lieutenant & remained in that Regt. in that character until as well as is recollectable about the year 1783 when he resigned his commission and that shortly after he joined the Regt. of State Troops — ~~the 1st South Carolina~~ commanded by Genl Simcoe in the character of Lieut. with which he remained until near the close of the war. The declaration further sets forth that the several

commissions which he held during the war has been lost by time or accident so that he has ~~been~~
not now to procure, and that he never then gave such worth in the Seige of Charleston
and Savannah.

The Relator further saith he is now in his fifty ninth year of age and that on account of his advanced circumstances, his age and failing infirmities he needs the assistance of his country for the support of himself and family.



obtain for herself and the other surviving
children of the said Capt. John Bird dec'd
(if alive) the Benefit of the act of Congress
of the 4th June 1818.

On this the 24th day of April 1841
presently appearing before the Court of Common
for the said District Anna C. Smith, a
resident of the District of Union in the State
aforesaid witness being fully sworn when
the lay evangelist of Almighty God depothes
says, that she is the daughter of the
above named Capt. John Bird dec'd whom she
is informed & believes was a soldier of the Revolution
and drew a Pension of Two hundred & forty dollars
per annum under the act of Congress of the 18th March
1818. That she was informed long before the
death of her said Father (which took place on
the 4th day of December, 1818) that he was
entitled to an increase of Pension under the
act of Congress passed the 4th June 1818, and
made an attempt to obtain it, but owing to his
being entirely blind for several years previous
to his death, he was unable to trace about
to obtain it or attend to it, and it was therefore
neglected. This deponent further states that
at the time of the death of her father the said
Capt. John Bird dec'd. he left the widow, his
wife, the mother of this deponent, having died

Many years before, but that he left the
following Children, to wit The defendant
aged about fifty six years & residents in the
same District of Union. Sally Bird, now
the widow of James Carr, aged about sixty
years, living when last heard from somewhere
in the State of Mississippi, the County unknown.
A son Henry C Bird aged about fifty four
years, not heard from for some years, but when
last heard from said to be living in Texas
Catharine Bird, now Mrs Hancock aged
about fifty one years, and when last heard
from living in the State of Alabama, County
not known. James C Bird aged about
forty six years, living when last heard from
in the State of Alabama County not known.

Having been some years since the above
named brother and sister of the defendant were
heard from with any certainty although she has
made efforts to hear from them, she does not
know whether they are alive or not.

The said John Bird did had one other
son whose name was John Bird but who died
many years before his father and left five
children, the survivors of these children if any
at the death of the said Capt John Bird did
reside at defendant's residence somewhere in
the far west - but she cannot state anything
more definite in regard to them.

This defendant deems it unnecessary
to say anything in regard to the Revolutionary
services of her father. She refers to the
Evidence now on the files of the proper
Department upon which the said John Bird

was placed upon the Pension Roll under the
act of Congress of the 18th March 1818, and
requests that of the said John Ward as her
father, is entitled to an increase of Pension under
the act of Congress of the 4th March 1812, her rights
may not be withheld but allowed to her according
to Law. She further states, that she has
always understood that her father did not
resign in 1787 but that he was taken prisoner
by the British in 1781, and begs that she
be permitted to offer Proof upon the subject
with the view to cover the Commutation &
Pension Fund to which she has been led to look
her said Father was entitled. If however
her father has stated in his Declaration that
he did resign in 1787, she admits that is conclusive
but begs that his declaration be reexamined
upon that subject.



On the twenty-first day of
January A.D. 1848 personally appeared before the
Court of Ordinary for the District aforesaid, Daniel
Smith and his wife Ann C. Smith the Daughter of
Capt. John Bird dec'd. late a resident of the same
District and State, and who died on the fourth day of
December 1845 being at her death about Eighty five
years of age, which said Daniel and Ann C.
Smith after being duly sworn according to law,
doth on their oaths make the following declaration,
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made
by the act of Congress passed June 7th 1852,

That the said Ann C. Smith formerly Ann C.
Bird, is the Daughter of the said John Bird,
and the only Child of his known to be living;
that her eldest brother John Bird died in ~~Mississippi~~
about fifteen or sixteen years ago.

Sally C. Bird the next oldest, married Sam. Carr
and when last heard from about eight years ago,
resides in Mississippi.

Ann C. is the next in age.

Henry C. Bird the next, was in Arkansas
about five years ago when last heard from.
Catherine Bird the next, married Richard ~~Bird~~
and when last heard from about four years ago, was
in Macclure Alabama.

James C. Bird the youngest, was in Cleveland Mar
about four years ago, when last heard from.

repeated exertions have been made during the two
 past years, to hear from all the above named
~~brother & sister~~, by the declarants, but in vain,
 therefore they have been led to the melancholy
 conclusion that they must all be dead... they are
 the only children of the said John Bird deceased
 and all by the same wife, as he was never but
 once married, and his wife died some years
 previous to his death.

These declarants know that the said John
 Bird was a Revolutionary Pensioner, and drew
 a Pension of £200. per annum as a Lieutenant
 under the act of 1798, and this was made, for an
 addition under the act of 1832, to which sum and
 they believe he was entitled, that they have often
 heard him speak of his services, and have every
 reason to believe he served as stated in his affidavit
 made before his death, which is herewith sent,
 together with the affidavits of Joseph H. Junkin and
 Thomas Young in his behalf, who were both in the
 Revolutionary War by reputation, and both drew
 Pensions.

Pinckney in the service of the United States; that his name was placed on the pension roll of the state of South Carolina; that he received a certificate of that fact, under the signature and seal of the Secretary of War; which certificate, on or about the ~~15th~~ day of December 1822, at or near Columbia in South Carolina he was robbed of sundry papers, and his Certificate among them

The oath to be taken before a duly qualified magistrate, whose official character and signature must be properly authenticated.

If the pensioner has never received a formal certificate, but has drawn his pension on a mere notification, as was the case in a few instances many years ago, he should leave out the above words in italics, and insert, in lieu thereof, "but has never received a formal certificate, and now wishes to obtain one."

 my Country land and that I never obtained
 a pay and said I must look to the government

I was also at the siege of Forty Lee where General Green commanded I was at Ferguson's defeat at King Mountain I was at the Cowpens at Cartlton's defeat under the command of General Morgan I was at Pendleton's defeat the day after General Gates had been defeated on the Catawba River (I was in many other skirmishes too tedious to mention the above battles are not put down in the order that they took place but I was at them all)
