

Isaiah lodged at Springfield, NJ and was in the battle at Monmouth Court House, NJ, June, 1778. He was in the battle at Stony Point, NY, 1779. In Aug. 1780 Isaiah Smith was promoted from Pvt. to Cpl.

At winter quarters, Morristown, NJ, Cpl. Isaiah Smith deserted Dec. 28, 1780. He was demoted in July, 1781, from Cpl. to Pvt. He was a Pvt. for the remainder of the war. There was insubordination of Washington's troops at the Morristown camp that winter. The tired and weary soldiers complained of the food, lack of clothing and pay.

In July 1781, he was in the battle at Green Spings, SC and at Yorktown, VA where Cornwallis surrendered. Isaiah Smith's name is recorded as a Rev. War soldier at Yorktown.

Bounty Land Warrant record #6506 (Nov. 15, 1792) for Isaiah Smith is a blank page. Isaiah sold his property in Orange Co., NY. He and his family first went to the Military tract at Scipio, Cayuga Co., NY for a year or more before their final home at Richmond (Canadice), Ontario Co., NY. He and his sons Robert, Samuel, Isaiah, Jr. and Caten John Smith are on the early Richmond, NY tax rolls. Sons Robert and Samuel were in the War of 1812.

After the 1830 census, his widow Ann Williams Smith moved with her daughter Hannah J. Ward to Brooklyn, NY. His widow, Ann or Nancy Smith applied for a widow's pension in 1839. # W17826. Ann was known as Nancy in the family full of women named Ann. Her death date and place of burial are unknown. Two of his daughters are buried in Canadice Corners Cemetery.

Memorial for Isaiah Smith maintained by 4G granddaughter of Isaiah Smith. His wife Ann Williams Smith is not buried in this cemetery, but their daughters, Sebraiah Smith Schenck and Ann Smith Quick are buried here.
