Died at Hot Springs, Ark. Aug. 14th, 1905, after months of suffering from a cancer in his throat, Mr. A. A. Gulley, of Fayetteville.

His wife was with him all the time and did all a loving, devoted wife could do to soothe and comfort him as he neared the crossing of the Jordan of death.
