Pages 42-44: ____ 1789, Will of Oliver Wallace Jun'r of York County... to my wife Judith Wallace my oldest bay mare with a woman's saddle & bridle, also a feather bed & furniture with all her wearing apparel and an equal part with my 3 daughters and my household furniture. My said wife to have as comfortable & genteel a living off of the plantation I now live on as the same will admit of, with the service of my negro boy Snow, to assist in the raising & support my four children during my said wife's state of widowhood, and one cow & Calf for my said wife for her use and benefit forever. The remainder of my cattle stock to be equally divided between my 3 daughters and the unbequeathed part of my household furniture with my present sheep & hog stock. To my son Oliver Berry Wallace the plantation whereon I now live, estimated 100 acres of land with all my plantation utensils, one P Steel-yards and one P Spoon-moulds & young hold colt. I appoint my friend Thomas Wallace & Andrew Love Esq'r, my executors and my said wife Judith Wallace,

Pages 35-37: South Carolina, York District. Will of Martha Wallis of district aforesaid... My beloved husband the Rev. James Wallis having by a deed of trust made to David Hutcheson dated 9 May 1818 authorised me to dispose of the property therein contained agreeable to my own will & pleasure. To my husband James Wallis \$500 for the great care & attention to me since our marriage. My brother Saml Elliott being in possession of a cotton gin which I paid for, I allow him to keep said gin by paying to my son Wm. E. Whyte when he comes to full age the same price it cost me without interest, also the hire of a negro man called Dick which he had in the year 1818. To my sister Dorcas one good bed with curtains & all furniture, also all my wearing apparel that I may have at my death. My negro man Ben named in the deed of trust before mentioned be sold and what stock of horses, cattle, etc., to be sold or kept or sold as my executors may thing most for the benefit of my estate. I appoint my brother Saml Elliott & David Hutcheson, exrs., 21 Oct 1819. Martha Wallis (LS), Wit: John Cathey, George Cathey, James Perry.
